Rural Refugee Network Receives Grant for Youth Discovery Project

Petersfield, UK July 6, 2024. The Rural Refugee Network (RRN), a charity dedicated to supporting refugees and asylum seekers in Hampshire, is pleased to announce it has received a National Lottery award from The National Lottery Community Fund for their Youth Discovery Project.

The grant, generously provided by the National Lottery Community Fund, comes at a pivotal time for RRN as it seeks to expand its impact and engagement with unaccompanied asylum seeking youth in Portsmouth and Hampshire. With this crucial support, RRN will be able to accelerate its efforts and ensure the development of the Youth Discovery Project which works with some of the most vulnerable youth in our community.

Every year, countless children find themselves displaced and alone, seeking refuge from violence, persecution, and conflict in their home countries. Many of these children arrive in the UK with no family, limited resources, and profound trauma. The Youth Discovery Project has been supporting this cohort since launching in 2020 with grants from the South Downs National Park and Nordson Corporation.

The Lottery funding will enable RRN to expand its provision with a Drop-in centre covering ESOL, life skills and exciting activities whilst carrying on with monthly outings and an annual residential. We will be working together with community groups and stakeholders in the Portsmouth area.

We are eager to embark on this next phase of our journey and look forward to the positive impact it will have on the young people and our wider community. The organization extends its deepest thanks to National Lottery Foundation and the National Lottery players for their generosity and support.

Through our South Downs Youth Discovery Project for young asylum seekers and refugees, who came to the UK alone and are in local authority care, we organise regular outings and activities in the countryside to enrich their understanding of nature, while helping them to build their confidence, have fun, practice English, meet friends and learn more about life in the UK.
